Workshop Description

The opioid epidemic is having a significant impact on the Tri-State area with a dramatic increase in the number of children exposed to opioids in-utero and born with Neonatal Opioid Withdrawal Syndrome (NOWS). This workshop will provide an overview of neonatal, early childhood, and long-term outcomes of children born with NOWS. Additionally, it will provide a review of strategies to foster early cognitive/language development in early childhood, a known area of significant need in these children. Finally, the role the Child Welfare system plays in shaping the development of these children will also be discussed.

Speakers

Lesley Raisor-Becker, PhD, is a researcher, teacher, and practicing clinician specializing in the language and literacy development of infants, toddlers, and preschoolers. Her research interests include the effects of prenatal drug/alcohol exposure on development, social skills and executive functioning in children. Dr. Raisor-Becker has adopted two children from foster care and has committed her career and personal life to helping vulnerable children.
